Nan and I had a lovely break in the Highlands, with no midges and only one day of rain, so no complaints there! The highlights included sightings of two Slavonian grebes in summer plumage and great views of ospreys.

We "Stepped up for Nature" during the summer months (as we are all encouraged to do by RSPB Scotland), having had our annual public bird walks at Rozelle Park in Ayr. This year we were even more successful than usual with a record 39 people joining us for the two walks. We had a display at the "Churches give to Grow" day at Newton-Wallacetown Church in Ayr. We also were present at this year's "Celebrate Ayrshire" event, complete with our own gazebo and display stands. This took place at the NTS Culzean Country Park in June. We attended the "Armed forces day" at Ayr's Low Green on a very blustery and cold July day. The PS "Waverley" trips are going well, despite the poor weather. On the 23rd of July we saw around 200 puffins on the water and flying around Ailsa Craig, and the gannetry appears to be going from strength to strength with new areas of the island being colonised. It was also good to see so many young common guillemots amongst the hundreds we saw in rafts on the calm waters of the Firth of Clyde. I would like to say a big thank you to all who took part and are taking part in these events. I would also like to say a big thank you to Waverley Steam Navigation, who continue to welcome us aboard to help inform all passengers about the RSPB reserve of Ailsa Craig and its bird life.

I look forward to welcoming everyone back for our new session, we have a nice mix of interesting talks and outings which our deputy leader Anne Dick, our outdoor leader Jim Thomson and coach trip organiser Tony Scott, have put together for our enjoyment. Thanks go to all our other committee members for their dedicated work, and to you all for supporting us. Join us for a Mull eagle watch

Saturday 27 to Tuesday 30 April 2013

RSPB Central Ayrshire and SOC Ayrshire are joining forces once again on a three-night Mull long weekend in April 2013. It is our intention to travel by small luxury coach from Dodds of Troon, crossing over to the Isle of Mull from Oban to Craignure. We intend to visit the top birding spots on the island and the actual itinerary will depend very much on where we stay. This can only be decided once we have enough of our members interested in joining the trip. More details and joining forms will be available at the first two meetings of RSPB in Ayr and SOC in Monkton.

To give us maximum time on Mull and Iona, we will attempt to take the midday ferry on the 27th and return mid afternoon to Oban and back to Ayrshire on the 30th of April. Needless to say, our top birds will be white-tailed eagle, golden eagle and hen harrier, but there are many more interesting species to find on both of the islands we will be visiting.

As a taster - here are just some of the places we intend to visit. GLEN MORE - Excellent for observing upland species such as hen harrier and short-eared owl, buzzard, golden eagle, white-tailed eagle, kestrel and raven. In the valley floor and lower hillsides we may look for curlew, cuckoo, whinchat, stonechat and wheatear. Glen More is 16km from Craignure. MISHNISH LOCHS - on the B8073 towards Dervaig. The lochs are stocked with brown trout and attract little grebe, grey heron, red-throated diver, and occasionally goosander. Hen harrier, buzzard, golden eagle and short-eared owl may also be around. About 5km from Tobermory. LOCHDON - has residents which include grey heron, mute swan, eider, red-breasted merganser, hen harrier, buzzard and redshank. 5km south of Craignure. Passage waders include grey plover, knot, sanderling, both bar and black-tailed godwits, and whimbrel. In recent years, pectoral sandpiper, ruff, spotted redshank and green sandpiper have been recorded. LOCH NA KEAL is 4.8km from Salen on the B8035. This is a large sea loch with varied coastline and several islets and skerries. Shag, eider, ovstercatcher, red-breasted merganser, curlew and redshank can be seen all year. Slavonian grebe numbers often peak in April. FIONNPHORT & IONA. Fionnphort is at the end of the A849 and 64km from Craignure. The ferry crosses from here to the sacred isle of Iona (1.6km). Fidden is another 1.6km to the south and has a diverse mix of intertidal habitat, coastal farmland and lowland moor and is good for waders and passerines. Just to the east of Fionnphort is Loch Phoit, where little grebe are present all year. **THE ISLE OF IONA** has low-lying rocky moorland, fertile hay meadows, sandy bays and exposed sea cliffs. Fulmar, shag and kittiwake breed to the south west. Rock dove and jackdaw elswhere. Linnet, twite and yellowhammer are common all year. Iona is the most likely place to hear corncrake - the fields around the abbey and village being best. LOCH SCRIDAIN is 33km from Craignure on the A849. Best known for great northern divers - but all three are present (in



winter). Individuals can also be seen in summer. This is also a very good spot to see otters.

BIRD CALENDAR. Species which can be seen all year on Mull include: red-throated diver, fulmar, redbreasted merganser, hen harrier, sparrowhawk, buzzard, golden eagle, white-tailed eagle, kestrel, merlin, peregrine, red grouse, ptarmigan, ringed plover, snipe, woodcock, redshank, greenshank, common gull, common guillemot, razorbill, black guillemot, rock dove, tawny owl, short-eared owl, great spotted woodpecker, rock pipit, grey wagtail, dipper, stonechat, raven, siskin, twite, redpoll, crossbill, yellowhammer. April into May: great northern diver, goldeneye. Breeding birds include Manx shearwater, golden plover, common sandpiper, kittiwake, common and Arctic terns, cuckoo, sand martin, tree pipit, redstart, whinchat, wheatear, ring ouzel, sedge warbler, tree pipit, common redstart, whinchat, wheatear, common whitethroat and wood warbler. Spring passage birds include pink-footed goose, golden plover, sanderling, occasional spotted redshank, black-tailed godwit, whimbrel, kittiwake and (in April) white wagtail.

We will be basing our initial price on bed and breakfast in good en-suite accommodation in ideally three-star hotels. On Mull, there is very little choice in anything of a lower category, unless one looks for guest houses (which would be unlikely to have enough accommodation for our group). We will base the costing on a maximum of 17 participants. Initial enquiries suggest the total cost of all coach travel from and back to Ayr, three nights bed and breakfast in en-suite accommodation and ferry crossings would be about £295 per person. If we can also get a good deal to include dinner on each of the three evenings we would accept it, but inevitably this would increase the cost somewhat. Cost all comes down to supply and demand in the Highlands and Islands, and the demand is getting greater at all times of the year now.

It would be very helpful if all inerested parties would pay a deposit of £75 as this would enable us to secure rooms in the most conveniently placed hotel. We need to do this well before the end of the year of course. We look forward to a most rewarding experience with the large raptors playing a big part in the enjoyment of all of us.

RAPTOR MIGRATION IN CÁDIZ PROVINCE AND THE STRAITS OF GIBRALTAR

Join Angus Hogg for seven full days in one of the prime birding regions of southern Spain, to observe the migration of raptors, storks and many other species as they move south across the Straits of Gibraltar into Africa. Or take time out from birding to join Gerda and Tony Scott as they explore the villages and towns of the Costa de la Luz, such as the haunting Moorish hill town of Vejer, the ancient Roman settlement of Baelo Claudia, the town of Tarifa and the harbour town of Cádiz, one of the oldest settlements in Spain. Apart from the spectacle of the autumn migration here, the Tarifa hinterland is rich in breeding species of rocky, wooded country. There are some very large vulture colonies, with griffon, Egyptian and a few black vultures. There have been recent records of Lammergeiers, Rüppell's vultures, long-legged buzzards and Lanner falcons, especially in the autumn. The beach area at Tarifa is a favourite for large groups of gulls, including Audouin's. Tern flocks form on the lagoon fringes and include some lesser crested terns in autumn, as well as large numbers of waders. Passerines throng the fields and pines at times of migration, so time will be at a premium to see all that is about. We hope to stay at the Meson de Sancho (3*), a traditional style Andalusian mansion, close to Los Alcomales Nature Reserve and just inland from Tarifa. We anticipate that the final cost will be in the region of £950 per person for all flights, coach travel, dinner, bed and breakfast for

eight nights (nine days) and the services of our bird leader.
